"On the edge..." I can't think of a more fitting theme for life in general, or for these "formulative years" of high school.




On the Edge of. . .





Semi-Formal


"Shake your booty and get funky!" On Rebruary 9, 1991

Extra Spirit



The cast pulled together into a comfortable unit to perform in the round, with the appreciated help from the


lighting and set construction crews.






THE RULER'S EDGE



THE EDUCATOR'S EDGE







He came to work as an English teacher at Mattituck High School in the 1987-1988 school year, when this year's senior class were Mattituck's freshmen.

He walked the hallways of MHS with his very individualistic, striding, "up down" gait. He carried the largest and widest briefcase of all the faculty. He had a habit of placing one foot up on a desk in front of him and leaning on it, like he could be more in tune with his students if he just leaned a little closer to them. He also had this laugh, where no sound came out of his mouth. All of his behaviors somehow contributed to his unique, appreciated, and styled teaching methods.

For his first freshmen class, he opened himself up to sing a rendition of the spiritual "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," on the last day of classes. We can still recall the story he told about singing on the way to school to warm up his voice; and the driver who stared at him in shock as they both stopped for a red light. This teacher's song meant everything to that class. It meant a teacher honored our classroom performance and effort enough to give us the gift of his own performance.

He went on to become "the silent advisor" of the Mattitalk. His job seemed purposely to keep us thinking and improving as reporters. He also entertained a few philopophical discussions during the crazed meetings.

He then became "Tom" the director, to MHS students and faculty. This man in plaid flannel and workboots devoted countless hours of attention, energy, and life to his cast.

This year he had some of those "yesteryear" freshmen as seniors, in his English class. The formerly established respect between students and teacher remained in tact, four years later.

This man has held a presence immediately with the Class of '91, and has never lost his sync with the students. It is for this and all the other subtle ways he has touched our lives that we, the graduating class, dedicate the 1991 Reflector to Mr. Thomas Brennan.








NJROTC














Cross Country




