
As each class ventures into the world they will be able to draw from the learning experiences they had, not only in mathematics and physics but also in accepting personalities and goals different from their own.







1993 Student Exchange


hile some of you worked, loafed, swam, surfed or partied last summer, twenty-two students from Mattituck High ventured across the ocean to experience a new culture.


